

Gift giving for grandparents: Go beyond plastic toys

Have you ever considered that much of the toys kids end up with will outlive the kids themselves in landfills and oceans? Cheap, plastic toys are pervasive. Walk through a dollar store with a child, and their eyes will light up at all the bright plastic items that are sure to bring a moment of joy. But kids may not yet recognize that that moment of pleasure is not worth the long-term impact of purchasing that item—but as grownups, we can.

But gift-giving is fun! We like to see that moment of joy. Here are some tips to help you make gift-giving to kids mean something more.



- Instead of going to a dollar store or toy store, take children to a secondhand store. There's still a toy section and it's a great chance to teach about the importance of reusing and keeping items out of landfill.
- Give handmade gifts. Often these items become cherished keepsakes.
- Be cautious of craft items. Craft kits tend to come with a lot of packaging. And kids will quickly churn through small plastic tubs of paint and tubes of glitter glue. Speaking of glitter—it's a micro-plastic—yikes—although biodegradable options are available, for a price. Try to

buy refillable items - like big jugs of glue or paint to refill small containers. If children are young and unlikely to put caps on markers consistently, stick to crayons or pencils. Markers dry out quickly.

- Try giving the gift of time and attention rather than material things. Children move on from toys very quickly, and so while there may be that moment of excitement and few days of play, pretty soon items get shelved or stuffed under a bed. But, when you spend time playing with children or doing an activity together, you're letting the child know they matter, they're worthy of your time, and you're helping to make memories that will stick around.
- Give books (but not just any book). When looking for children's books, be conscious of the content. Most children's books feature white lead characters or animals. But books are an excellent way for children to learn that our communities are very diverse and that there's value in everyone. - It can be tricky to change habits, yes, but by now it's pretty clear we can't continue consuming at the rate we do. Spend some time reflecting on the impact you want to have on both the planet and the kids in your life. If we get this right, adult children and grandchildren will look back, grateful that they were taught not to contribute to the environmental problem they are now having to solve, rather than resentful that the earlier generation—today's grownups—kicked the climate crisis can down the road.




Being a part of the team is an opportunity to renew or build new friendships, to connect with other retired educators, and to share your talents or interests.

IT'S ELECTION SEASON IN ONTARIO Election day is Thursday, June 2, 2022.

How to vote?

If you registered to vote, your voting card will be mailed to you before election day, and it will tell you the location of your assigned voting station.

Ontarians will have to bring one piece of ID with their name. If you didn't get your voter card in the mail, then be sure to have a government issue ID with you that also has your address listed. Examples of ID include your driver's licence, health card, passport or birth certificate.

Voting hours are between 9 a.m. and 9 p.m.

There are other ways to fulfil your civic duty:

- Vote at an advance voting location, open from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. Advance polling stations can be open ten days before the elections.
- You can apply to vote by mail beginning May 4, 2022. Submit an application to vote by mail at or before 6 p.m. on May 27. For mail-in ballots to be counted, Elections Ontario has to have your vote by 6 p.m. on June 2

If you choose to vote by mail you need to fill out an Elections Ontario's Vote By Mail application online, or by downloading and printing an application or by picking up an application at your local election returning office.

Where to vote?

During election season, you can find out where you need to vote through Elections Ontario's Voter Information Service.

How to register to vote?

Ontarians can register to vote through Elections Ontario's eRegistration Website. Here you can add all your information to the voter's list before the election.

Election Ontario's hours are Monday to Friday from 8:30 AM to 4:30 PM (Eastern

Time). They are closed weekends and statutory holidays.

Add Your Vibrant Voice Older adults are the fastest growing age group in Canada. Advocate for age friendly communities that support aging in place.

Helping people stay in their homes and communities is good public policy. Health care costs increase on the continuum from home care to long-term care to acute care. A 2021 study* by the Canadian Medical Association estimates eldercare costs will double by 2031—to \$58.5 billion annually. The study found that better home care options could save \$794 million per year by 2031, and moving older adults waiting in hospital to more appropriate settings could save another 1.4 billion annually. That's why aging in place is deeply embedded in the political advocacy we do at RTOERO.

Older adults are the fastest growing age group in Canada. Do what you can as an individual to support yourself and your family members. Also, consider supporting candidates in the June 2, 2022 Ontario Provincial Election who champion this view. There is a Inuktitut word, ajuinata, roughly pronounced aye-yoo-ee-nah-tah. On Gov. Gen. Mary Simon's recent visit to Windsor Castle . she reportedly used this old word when speaking to Queen Elizabeth. "Ajuinata means that if you're confronted with adversity or things that are difficult, you keep going, you don't give up, and you need to make a commitment to continue to make changes," explained Simon.* Ajuinata seems a powerful affirmation, as RTOERO members, to find our Voice in this important election.

- Ongoing **environmental stewardship** for the survival of current and future generations, including the responsible use of resources, conservation and protection of air, land and water

exquisite and intricate in beauty, lies broken.


dishonoured

You can have it all at your fingertips without leaving your home.

Time to Like & Share


District 10 has had a Facebook page for a number of years now.

RTOERO encourages districts to have a social media presence, specifically a Facebook page as an outreach tool to district members.

What are the advantages and benefits of Facebook to RTOERO members?

Facebook is interactive. Unlike a webpage where you can seek information, the design of Facebook encourages participants to 'like' and 'comment' about things posted. They can also post questions and share with others who might be interested.

Facebook can be accessed even if you do not have a Facebook account. Let's take fictional member Juan. He doesn't like the idea of Facebook and has never wanted to set up an account. But he knows that District 10 has an account and has heard that he can view upcoming district events there. All Juan has to do is type *District 10 RTOERO Facebook* in his web browser and he'll arrive at this page:



Juan will be asked to login or create a new account but he can press X and just keep reading posts on the district's Facebook page. In order for Juan to be able to 'like' or 'comment,' he would have to create an account or log into an existing account.

The District 10 Facebook page is a place where members can connect and be social with other like-minded members. They can learn about upcoming events and stay connected by viewing photos/images from district meetings and outings that

they had not been able to attend. They can find current information about some local events at museums, theatres, and other venues in the district. It's an interface where followers of the page can chat and participate in discussions.

Action item: Consider 'liking' District 10's Facebook page. Simply type *District 10 RTOERO Facebook* into your web browser where you'll be able to follow the prompts to log in or create an account. Looking forward to meeting you there.


Hello all! I miss your faces. We would like to have a reconnecting of our RTOERO Unit.

Don Sankey has been a member of RTOERO District 10 Bruce Grey Unit 1 Executive for approximately 18 years. Don is the Public Relations Chair looking after promoting RTOERO in the Bruce Grey community. He looks after the District 10 Community Service Awards given out yearly to each secondary school in Bruce and Grey Counties.

Don is a member of the Friends of Moreston, the fundraising division of Grey Roots Museum located outside of Owen Sound. He also works as a volunteer in the schoolhouse during the summer months. He organizes clean up of the grounds and painting of the buildings in Moreston Village. Don has compiled stories from RTOERO

members who taught in a one-room schoolhouse and published a journal of their stories available at the Grev Roots gift shop. As an ardent photographer, Don has also produced calendars and other photos used in marketing the museum. Friends of Moreston hold an annual Christmas craft show and are currently holding a silent auction to raise money for their next project, the General Store. Don was part of the committee made up of RTOERO members who initiated and completed the construction of the schoolhouse at Grey Roots.

Don has been a member and Chair of the Grey Sauble Conservation Foundation for many years. This foundation, established in 1993, raises money to assist the GSCA with programs and projects.
